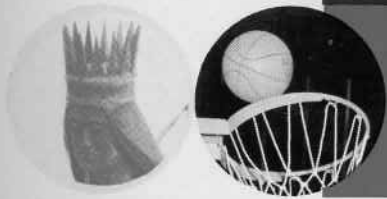

Unpredictable is one word that probably best describes the 1963-64 Eaglet Varsity basketball squad as it rolled up a respectable 14-5 won-lost record.

At times, showing flashes of greatness and at other times, lapsing into frustratingly shabby basketball, the Eaglets finished with an 8-4 slate in the Northwest Catholic League behind champion Royal Oak St. Mary and runner-up Pontiac St. Michael. Ironically, it was both these schools which defeated St. Mary's. In five non-league tilts, Orchard Lake went undefeated. In State District Tournament play, St. Mary's whipped Northville and were eliminated by West Bloomfield.

Coach Father John Rakoczy's team centered around scrappy and lightning-quick Frank Rompel, St. Mary's all-everything. The 5-foot-8 guard scored 332 points in the season for a solid 17.5 per game average. He hit a season high of 30 points against Our Lady of the Lakes. In six games, he scored more than 20 points.

Lanky 6-foot-4 John Stolnicki filled in at center. He had a 13.1 average. Connie Krogulecki was Rompel's guard-mate, scored 11.5 points per game; Ralph Kibiloski averaged 10.4 from one forward spot while Ken Kwilosz and tall John Stepien shared the other forward spot.

For the first six games, Orchard Lake was even for the record. They lost twice to Royal Oak St. Mary, 65-44 and 68-50, and once to St. Michael, 67-54, while turning the tables on St. Stanislaus in a non-league opener, St. Agatha, and Our Lady of the Lakes. From this point, Orchard Lake proceeded to win 11 of its next 13 games.

Our Lady of Sorrows was the first to fall before the rejuvenated Eaglets, 75-64. Rompel scored 21 points, Stolnicki had 19, Krogulecki 18 and Kwilosz 10 in one of Orchard Lakes better ballgames. In a real close one, St. Agatha bowed, 63-60, after trailing by just two points at the half. St. Frederick went down, 70-51, with Rompel and Krogulecki each collecting 15 points.

Orchard Lake lost its second game to St. Michael in the last few seconds, 42-41. At the half, the Eaglets held a five-point advantage but St. Michael tied the game in the third quarter. The score going into the final eight minutes was 33-33. Stolnicki led the Eaglets' losing effort

with 18 points and Rompel had 13.

In order then, Orchard Lake raced over Our Lady of the Lakes twice, St. Frederick twice, St. Ladislaus, St. Benedict, and Northville before ending its season in the State Districts. Orchard Lake scored a season-high 81 points against Our Lady of the Lakes, the same night that Rompel ripped the cords for 30.

The district games would make an interesting study in contrast. Against Northville, St. Mary's sizzled in the first half, racing to a 42-31 halftime lead on the strength of a 57 percent shooting average. The second half saw both schools score just 25 points. Orchard Lake won, 67-56, and had a 50 percent completion record from the floor. Kibiloski sparked OL with 22 points.

Two nights later, West Bloomfield jumped out in stunning fashion to a 20-5 first period lead and held it all the way against an inept Orchard Lake team which could not find the range. The final score was 54-43. Orchard Lake could make just 12 baskets out of 62 attempts for a measly 19 percent. Krogulecki had nine of these baskets for 24 points. Rompel, bothered by a severe knee injury, had 11. It was a sad night.

No one could blame Varsity Coach Father John Rakoczy if he wore rose-colored glasses during the Reserve basketball games in the 1963-64 season. This is the way the basketball future looks at St. Mary's—rosy!—on the basis of the fine 13-4 won-lost record carved by Coach Stanley Krogulecki's jayvee squad.

Just 21 points separated victory and St. Mary's in the four losses, preventing the Reserves from becoming the first undefeated JV team in a long time. Royal Oak St. Mary's delivered two losses to Orchard Lake, 46-43 and 72-63, while league champion Pontiac St. Michael's nipped the Eaglets, 50-47 and Detroit St. Agatha shaded the locals, 54-49.

Joe Wojtys, John Shaw, George Sawicki, Tom Buda, and David Cosnek formed the first five. Shaw led the year's scoring with a 12.6 average while Wojtys had 12.5.

Three of the four losses came in the first seven games. Thereafter, the junior Eaglets settled down to take nine of the last ten games. Five wins came against non-league foes.

Both Wojtys and Shaw turned in 28-point nights. Wojtys' came in the 72-63 loss to Royal Oak St. Mary's while Shaw chalked his up in a 77-51 win over St. Frederick's.

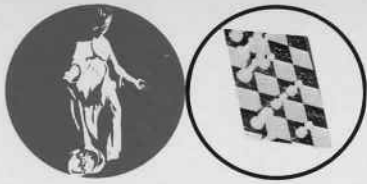

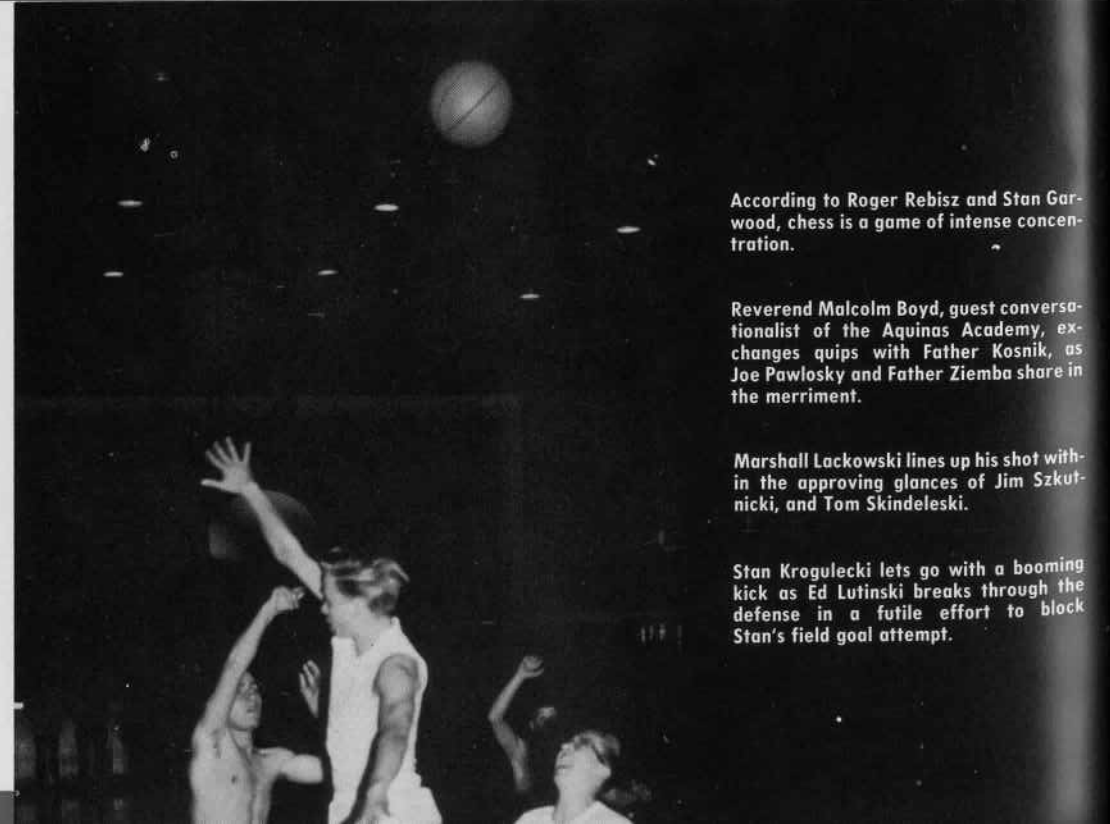

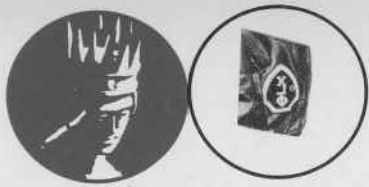

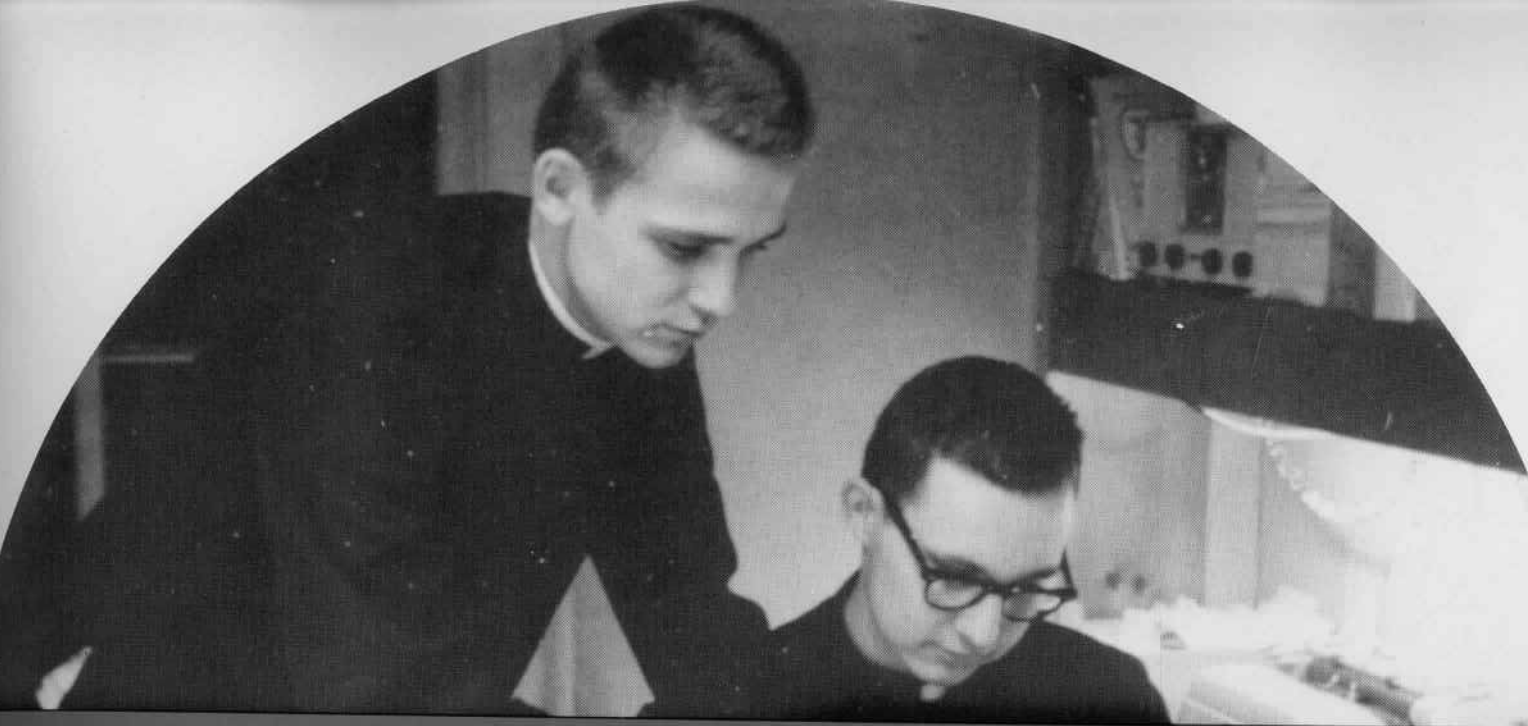

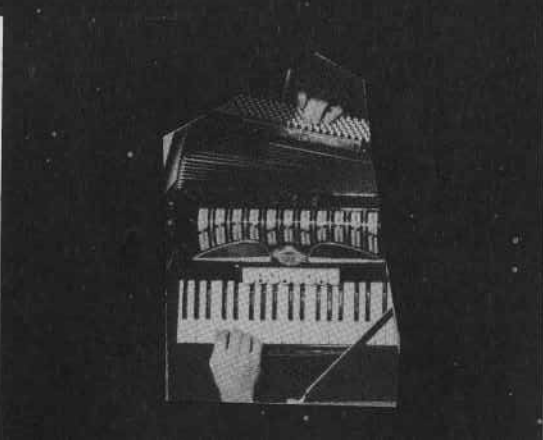
