







VITAL STATISTICS

Since the Parish is the "Mystical Body in Miniature," there is no activity that can equal the importance of that body. The following statistics are a glorious record of the flow of Graces from the Cross of Calvary to the people of St. Elizabeth's.


BAPTISM is the Sacrament of birth into the Church. Since 1885 the waters of regeneration have flown over the heads of 13,618 infants and 1,086 adults. Birth alone is not sufficient; cleansing and nourishment are as vital to spiritual life as physical life. 12,983 children made their FIRST HOLY COM-MUNION in this Parish.


Frequent reception of PENANCE and HOLY COMMUNION are necessary for the maintenance of a strong spiritual life. A conservative approximation of the number of times these Sacraments were administered would be: TWO and a QUARTER MILLION CONFESSIONS and EIGHT and a QUARTER MILLION HOLY COMMUNIONS!

CONFIRMATION, the Sacrament of Catholic Action, made 12,640 Parishioners soldiers in Christ"s Army during the past 75 years.

WEDDING BELLS have rung happily many times, 4,274 to be exact, and many have returned to renew their Marriage promises on the 25th. and 50th. Anniversaries.

CHRISTIAN BURIAL is beneficial both to the deceased and to the bereaved. These beautiful and consoling services were held 3,173 times. May we take this opportunity to remind ourselves to renew our prayers for those who have gone before us and now sleep the sleep of peace.

OUR NATIONALITIES

The never-ending vitality of St. Elizabeth's Parish, another Mystical Body in miniature, is strikingly demonstrated in the way that the newcomers to its neighborhood were grafted to it and became a living part of it.

When the doors of St. Elizabeth's Church were first opened in 1885, most of its original parishioners could speak the German language. Soon after that, they found themselves worshipping along side of Polish speaking people. No wonder, then, that the Kashubes, a European combination which evolved on the northern German-Polish borderline, seemed to find a touch of their fatherland here at St. Elizabeth's.

By 1942, eight hundred Italian families lived in this parish. It is interesting to note that Father Svensson brushed up his Italian, learned as a student in Italy, so that Mother Church could the better accommodate herself to the newcomers. The most recent influx has been that of Negroes. At the present time 2,058 homes in St. Elizabeth's Parish are now occupied by them. Already hundreds of them have been received into the Church and they enjoy membership in all of the parish organizations.

St. Elizabeth Parish welcomed all of these people and adopted them completely. It made them living members of its miniature Mystical Body. Some of these newcomers came directly from Europe and certain sections of the U.S.


where they had the services of a priest only several times a year. To all of the grace, instruction, and sanctity was dispensed with the love of Christ. In many respects, St. Elizabeth served as an Apostolic home mission front preaching the word of God to those who had never heard it, converting the sinner to the life of grace, and helping good people on the road to sanctity.



ST. ELIZABETH PARISH and the LITURGICAL MOVEMENT

Scattered chiefly throughout the entire East Side of Detroit are families who once attended St. Elizabeth School or Church. Their number might conservatively be estimated at 15 to 20 thousand people. There is one characteristic which immediately distinguishes them. They are faithful, loyal, and steady Parishioners. In many instances they are leaders in the Parishes which they now frequent. How did they get that way? There is but one answer. As the Priests of yore used to say: "They are well trained." Because of the fine old reliable customs which they brought with them from St. Elizabeth, they are ardent, practical Catholics today. Nothing contributed more to make these people wholesome Catholics that what is today popularly known as the "LI-TURGICAL MOVEMENT." Throughout its entire lifespan, St. Elizabeth has practiced it. When Pope St. Pius the Xth. issued his decree on FREQUENT and EARLY COMMUNION, and that Parishes should return to wholesome Liturgical Singing, St. Elizabeth and its neighboring Parish of St. Anthony, were the first in the City to follow the Holy Father's decree. On the first Sunday in Advent of 1906, Fr. Anthony Ternes, 2nd. Pastor in the Parish, in answer to the Holy Father's decree, established a full male Choir under the direction of Professor Born. In 1927, when Fr. William P. Schulte, the 3rd. Pastor, took over the reigns of the Parish, he is especially well remembered for the exact carrying-out of the Liturgy, the establishment of the Holy Hour and Special Devotions to Our Lady. In 1932, Fr. Jos. V. Pfeffer, the 4th. and present Pastor of the Parish, began urging the custom of daily Holy Communion, not only for the CHILDREN but also for the ADULTS of the Parish. When this was well on its way, he systematically arranged for the GRAMMAR SCHOOL CHILDREN and the HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS to sing the two Parish Masses daily. These young people handle all the Church Services. They have established themselves as outstanding in the Archdiocese on such occasions as the 40 Hours Devotion or other public functions. In compliance with Pius XII's latest decree on LAY PARTICIPATION in the MASS, Msgr. Pfeffer has trained a group of High School boys to commentate at all the public Masses. It is these and other Religious customs that have endeared the people of St. Elizabeth to the Parish and have caused it to be known as a Eucharistic and Liturgical Parish.




